

WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP - After several months of planning, Birches Elementary School recently installed a rain garden in the school's courtyard that will serve as something its students can take ownership of this year and every year moving forward. Some of the final touches were put on the rain garden on Monday morning, as an enthusiastic group of about 50 students cleaned up the garden area and began planting flowers and plants under the watchful eye of the Gloucester County Master Gardeners.

A rain garden is a landscaped, shallow depression that allows rain and snowmelt to be collected and seep naturally into the ground. This helps recharge the groundwater supply and prevents a water quality problem called polluted runoff (nonpoint source pollution). Rain gardens are an important way to make cities and neighborhoods more attractive places to live while enhancing ecological health. The sand-based terrain of the Birches courtyard is a perfect spot for the rain garden, as rain and snow runoff from the school roof will be broken down and pollution limited.


Gardeners, were on hand on Monday to help the students plant the rain garden.
